




































































We Skipped Around Europe!

Over the past four weeks, our school has been buzzing with energy as we took part in the Active School Flag 'Skip Around Europe' Challenge 2025. From Junior Infants all the way to 6th Class, every pupil joined in the fun—and our skipping skills have improved hugely!

Each day, classes headed out to the yard to complete a few minutes of skipping. Every skip was counted as one kilometre, and each class picked a European destination to "travel" to using the helpful chart provided with the initiative. Totals were added up daily, and some classes even managed to skip all the way to their chosen countries and back again!



Thanks to the hard work and enthusiasm of our pupils, we collectively skipped over 100,000 kilometres—enough to travel all over Europe! And with the beautiful sunny weather throughout the challenge, it couldn't have been better timing.

But this challenge was about more than just fun. We saw lots of amazing benefits:

- Daily exercise helped everyone work towards the goal of 60 active minutes a day.
- Children came back to class more focused and ready to learn.

3rd Class have had a brilliant May, jam-packed with brilliant learning and fun events! In maths, the class have focused on all things shapes learning all about the varieties and properties of 2D and 3D shapes, exploring concepts such as symmetry and tessellation and even learning how to calculate the area of squares and rectangles! To help with this, 3rd class have done some really interesting tasks such as designing new sports stadiums using 2D shapes, creating tessellating sports people and even identifying different lines of symmetry, lines and angles in the flags of the world! They have also spent the month of May studying the continent of Oceania with a particular focus on New

Zealand! In SESE, we have identified similarities and differences between life in New Zealand and Ireland, explored and created comic strips focusing on a variety of famous Maori myths and have even created group projects on the different island nations of Oceania! In literacy, the children are in the process of learning how to write persuasively to help create travel brochures to attract tourists to a country in Oceania, and in art they have also designed some beautiful Maori totem poles! They have all really enjoyed learning about this unique continent! In Gaeilge, they have learnt about the different types of houses and the different rooms you might find

in each! They have learnt lots of new phrases and words through the use of role plays and are really trying hard to learn the rules of the Aimsir Cháite (past tense)!

In SPHE, the topics of strangers and making friends in new places have been focused on and the class have had some really enjoyable and interesting conversations. They have discussed the traits we look for in friends and have also identified how to act safely when around people we do not know. Finally, 3rd class have had a very active May too with active school week, cricket, hockey, swimming and athletics taking place! They have all shown a great level of enthusiasm, skill and teamwork throughout!



4th Class enjoyed a really active and sunny month of May. They kicked off the month with the 4-day active week with sports and activities taking place across the week such as cricket, hockey, yoga, boot camp and tennis. The participation from the class was amazing and they loved getting to try some new sports. 4th class completed both their English and maths Drumcondra


